A GROUNDBREAKING ECONOMIC BOOK FOR WOMEN TIRED OF MANSPLAINING

In the era of #metoo, author Rickey Gard Diamond creatively draws a more personal view of economics than usual, and joins other women economic "silence breakers" who are exposing the damaging impact of a male-controlled world of money. Forthcoming from She Writes Press (April 2018), *Screwnomics: How the Economy Works Against Women and Real Ways to Make Lasting Change* explains the underlying assumptions of an economic system that discounts the ties of nature, family, the value of mutual care, or the nation's future.

Screwnomics' atypical approach to the topic is at once serious and cheeky. Diamond includes her own family stories, along with those of other historical and contemporary women who encounter the character she names *EconoMan*. She says he's a half-conscious social construction, a hyper-masculine ideal that separates his accounts from the planet and its people—but especially from women. An award-winning journalist, as well as a fiction writer and educator, Diamond analyzes economic definitions and history, demystifying the usual obfuscation of EconoMan's language. She uncovers the sexual underpinning of bro-talk belittling all things female, but nowhere more than on Wall Street.

There, an overpopulation of male billionaires wage the economy as war. We need to wage life, Diamond says, and asserts that women who seldom have organized into gun-toting armies are the most likely to successfully negotiate the economic changes needed for a sustainable future. But not if they don't understand the game as it is played now. Her book gives every woman basic tools for understanding the micro-and macro-economy, translating terms in news stories while introducing solutions that women (and the men who love them) can use. She and illustrator Peaco Todd even add cartoons to illuminate and lighten "the dismal science."



Diamond defines her word Screwnomics* as "the unspoken but widely applied economic theory that women, including Mother Earth, should always work for less, or better, for free."



Introduction

The personal is political. The personal is economic.

"Screwnomics is a book for women like you, who until now have wisely avoided a dismal subject. You'd like to know more about economics, if only to hold on to more money, but something has warned you off, like a frat house late at night: hazing, secret clubs with creepy names, hoarding private privileges, taking advantage, scoring girls.

Oh, it's true. My mother wouldn't like my title for this book, but it's better than what she called the f-word. In her day the economic frat house wasn't so corrupt as it is today—not so in-your-face f**k you!—or so fast and desperately dangerous. Still the sexual messaging behind money has long been consistent and routine.

Screwnomics isn't intended to help you manage your personal finances, but it will explain the larger assumptions of a system that makes managing impossible for so many. Screwnomics is my word for the unspoken but widely applied economic theory that women should always work for less, or better, for free. But why? Where did this come from?

Inside I translate economic history, terms, and definitions that especially disadvantage women, here and around the world. I introduce you to new, countering ideas and solutions that don't require a PhD, and may even inspire you to broach an economic subject with your friends.

...I include shameful tales, insulting metaphors, and my family's dirty laundry. However different, all these elements carry a common thread of women confronting an ultra-masculine, ultra-rational mindset, the social construct of our time that I call EconoMan....

Around the world, women and their children remain ... the least noteworthy to most economists. For example, Thomas Piketty's celebrated 700-plus page work, *Capital in the Twenty-First Century*, which so expertly describes growing inequality, has exactly seven index listings for women or females....So this book is for the bit players, you and me, who only keep the whole show going, making sure everyone eats and has clean socks."

Screwnomics looks behind global finance to discover the story of our present system, and how we got here. Diamond often begins with personal tales about her own life, and also of her mother and grandmother, who were working women before it was trendy. Diamond's tone is light but biting. She gathers together female champions of the past and present, some of whose innovations are already changing ideas about banking, corporations, labor, currency and financial public policy.

Each chapter includes definition boxes that can be skipped, or read later. (There's also a glossary.) At the end of each chapter is a quick rehash, a thought-provoking Econo-Girlfriend question to connect women's lives to that chapter's subject—and a cartoon with women characters, who have their own tales to tell. Diamond intends to help women talk together about our last taboo subject—money.





Screwnomics' accompanying workbook, Where Can I Get Some Change? will be released in April/May 2018. Designed to help make group discussions friendlier, it prompts economic conversations among women who might not typically talk about this subject, or see its link to their everyday lives, or their common connection to each other.
